Proposed Action: Thurston Hills property funding

Fish and Wildlife Project No.: 2011-003-00, BPA-007071

Categorical Exclusion Applied (from Subpart D, 10 C.F.R. Part 1021): B1.25 Real Property transfers for cultural protection, habitat preservation, and wildlife management.

Location: Springfield quadrangle, in Lane County, Oregon (near Springfield, Oregon).

Proposed by: Bonneville Power Administration (BPA)

Description of the Proposed Action: BPA is proposing to fund the Willamalane Park and Recreation District purchase of the Thurston Hills property (Property), a 106-acre parcel of land located southeast of Springfield in Lane County, Oregon. The Willamalane Parks and Recreation District will own and manage the Thurston Hills property for wildlife conservation purposes and BPA will receive a conservation easement to ensure that the habitat values on the property are always protected.

This funding partially fulfills commitments made in the 2010 “Willamette River Basin Memorandum of Agreement Regarding Wildlife Habitat Protection and Enhancement between the State of Oregon and the Bonneville Power Administration”. This is part of BPA’s ongoing efforts to mitigate for the impacts to fish and wildlife of the construction and operation of federal flood control facilities in the Willamette River Basin. Placing this property in a conservation easement would provide long-lasting wildlife benefits as part of a growing network of conservation lands in the Willamette Valley by preventing the conversion of fish and wildlife habitat to other land uses.

The Property consists of approximately 106 acres of Willamette Valley prairie and forest habitats. The Property includes prairie, mixed conifer-oak woodland and forest, and mixed conifer-hardwood forest habitats. ESA-listed species found on site include Kincaid’s lupine (*Lupinus sulphureus ssp. Kincaidii*), Willamette daisy (*Erigeron decumbens var. decumbens*), and Fender’s blue butterfly (*Icaricia icarioides fenderi*).

Once the Willamalane Park and Recreation District acquires the property they will develop a management plan for long-term stewardship of the land. The management plan will be reviewed by BPA and Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, and approved by BPA. Prior to funding any management activities on the property, BPA will conduct further environmental review.

Findings: BPA has determined that the proposed action complies with Section 1021.410 and Appendix B of Subpart D of the Department of Energy’s (DOE) National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Regulations (57 FR 15144, Apr. 24, 1992, as amended at 61 FR 36221-36243, July 9, 1996; 61 FR 64608, Dec. 6, 1996, 76 FR 63764, Nov. 14, 2011). The proposed action does not present any extraordinary circumstances that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.

The proposal is not connected [40 C.F.R. 1508.25(a)(1)] to other actions with potentially significant impacts, has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts [40 C.F.R. 1508.25(a)(2)], and is not precluded by 40 C.F.R. 1506.1 or 10 C.F.R. 1021.211. Moreover, the proposed action would not (i) threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, (ii) require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities, (iii) disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that pre-exist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases, (iv) have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources, or (v) involve genetically engineered organisms, synthetic biology, governmentally designated noxious weeds, or invasive species, unless the proposed activity would be contained or confined in a manner designed and operated to prevent unauthorized release into the environment and conducted in accordance with applicable requirements.
