Proposed Action Title: Tour Engine, Inc. (Tour Engine) - High Efficiency Split-Cycle Engine for Residential Generators

Program or Field Office: Advanced Research Projects Agency - Energy

Location(s) (City/County/State): San Diego, CA; Newport Coast, CA; Bonita, CA; Escondido, CA; Madison, WI; and Tucson, AZ

Proposed Action Description:

Funding will support research and development activities to develop an Internal Combustion Engine (ICE) generator based on Tour Engine's split-cycle engine technology that divides processing into a cold cylinder (intake and compression) and a hot cylinder (expansion and exhaust) for use as a residential Combined Heat and Power (CHP) system. If successful, widespread deployment of highly efficient, compact, economical, and long-life residential CHP systems in the United States could lead to significant energy savings and a reduction in CO2 emissions associated with power plant electricity generation and household heating.

All research and development activities will be conducted in Manzke Machine, Inc.'s industrial research facility in Escondido, CA and HFE International's dynamometer engine testing facility in Tucson, AZ. Tour Engine's, Wisconsin Engine Research Consultant's, Next Step Engineering Solutions', and Hofman Design, Inc.'s participation in the proposed project will be limited to theoretical and computer simulation work performed in their San Diego, CA; Madison, WI; Bonita, CA; and Newport Coast, CA office facilities, respectively. All work will be performed in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and local safety and environmental requirements.

The proposal fits within a class of actions that is listed in Appendix A or B to 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.

There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.

The proposal has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion. This proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.25(a)(1)), is not related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.27(b)(7)), and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211 concerning limitations on actions during preparation of an environmental impact statement.

Based on my review of the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (as authorized under DOE Order 451.1B), I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class(es) of action, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is hereby categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
