Routine Maintenance Activities at Existing Facilities Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Utah, and New Mexico Project No. 2018-002 Expiration Date: February 28, 2024

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: The Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), Rocky Mountain Region (RMR), conducts routine maintenance activities at existing facilities in five states (Colorado, Nebraska, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming). These facilities include the Brush Field Office, Casper Service Center, Cheyenne Service Center, Cody Service Center, Craig Field Office, Gering Field Office, Hayden Field Office, Loveland Area Power and Marketing Operations Center, Montrose Power Operations Center, Salida Field Office, Shiprock Field Office, Vernal Field Office, and Virginia Smith Converter Station. These facilities are surrounded by an existing chain link fence and the entire area within this fenced perimeter has been previously disturbed.

The following activities occurring within the existing fenced perimeter of the facilities listed above are covered by this Categorical Exclusion (CX):

- (1) Servicing and testing of equipment;
- (2) Maintenance or installation of above ground propane tanks;
- (3) Repair and replacement of wiring;
- (4) Maintenance, installation, or removal of a solar power array panel and controller from structures;
- (5) Cleanup of spills that don't reach reportable quantities, as defined by RMR's Spill Response Plan (SRP);
- (6) Maintenance and repair of buildings and structures less than 45 years old;
- (7) Repair or remove existing fences and gates by hand;
- (8) Pest management within buildings;
- (9) Vegetation management, including herbicide application;
- (10) Grounds maintenance including snowplowing, mowing, and servicing septic tanks;
- (11) Installation and maintenance of portable sanitary facilities;
- (12) Placing fill or rocks around existing culverts, provided the material is brought in from a commercial source and ground disturbance is not necessary;
- (13) Testing for asbestos-containing materials (ACMs), polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), and lead-based paint;
- (14) Repair or replacement of existing asphalt, concrete, and gravel surfaces;
- (15) Any ground disturbing activity, not to exceed current depth of disturbance; and
- (16) Maintenance of existing spill containment, control, and countermeasure (SPCC) structures.

C. Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b): (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)

1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;
- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;

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- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

- 1) Activities not listed in Section A, Items 1 through 16, or activities that cannot be implemented while following all Special Stipulations in Section D, are not authorized to be completed under this CX. In these instances, the project proponent must contact RMR's Environment Department to initiate the appropriate environmental review.
- 2) **This CX is valid until February 28, 2024,** or until an updated version is executed by RMR's Environment Department, whichever comes first.
- 3) If any cultural resources are inadvertently discovered during implementation of the proposed action, work within 100-feet of the discovery area must halt immediately, RMR's Archaeologist must be contacted immediately. Work in the area of discovery must not resume until notification to proceed is provided by RMR's Archaeologist.
- 4) If any possible human remains are inadvertently discovered during implementation of the proposed action, work within 100-feet of the discovery area must halt immediately and RMR's Archaeologist must be notified immediately by telephone (no later than 24 hours from the time of discovery). A reasonable effort must be made to protect the remains from looting and/or further damage. Work in the area of discovery must not resume until notification to proceed is provided by RMR's Archaeologist.
- 5) U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Wildlife Services may be contacted at 866-487-3297 for assistance with nuisance wildlife.

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- 6) Pesticide and herbicide applicators must meet all state licensing requirements and must follow all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and guidelines. Applicators must use only EPA-registered pesticides and herbicides that are approved for the intended use and location, and must follow all applicable label directions.
- 7) For facilities covered by a current Spill Prevention, Control, Countermeasure (SPCC) Plan, RMR's Environment Department must be notified prior to installation, replacement, removal, or storage of any oil-containing equipment to ensure activities are in compliance with the requirements of the SPCC plan.
- 8) Activities involving the use of fuel, oil, hydraulic fluid, or other petroleum products must comply with RMR's SRP.
- 9) Lead-based paint, asbestos, PCBs, and other environmentally regulated materials requirements must be met.
- **E.** <u>Determination</u>: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
