

Project title: **Western Area Power Administration Sierra Nevada Exploration of Energy Imbalance Market**

Description of the Project

The Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), Sierra Nevada Region proposes to implement modifications to WAPA's transmission system data and power marketing operational software to begin participation in the CAISO energy imbalance market (EIM). The EIM allows for a more cost-effective and accessible platform to access low-cost energy resources across a wider region to meet real-time energy needs. The EIM also manages congestion on transmission lines to maintain grid reliability and supports integrating renewable resources. The agreement would not involve new generation or physical changes to the transmission system. If, at some point in the future during the course of implementing the agreement, WAPA nonetheless identifies previously unforeseen physical changes to the transmission system that are necessary to implement the agreement, WAPA will conduct the appropriate National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review for any such changes prior to implementation.

Category of Action

B4.4: Power marketing services and activities

Power marketing services and power management activities (including, but not limited to, storage, load shaping and balancing, seasonal exchanges, and other similar activities), provided that the operations of generating projects would remain within normal operating limits.

Regulatory Requirements for a Categorical Exclusion Determination

potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources, including, but not limited to, those listed in paragraph B(4) of 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D, Appendix B; (5) involve genetically engineered organisms, synthetic biology, governmentally designated noxious weeds, or invasive species, unless the proposed activity would be contained or confined in a manner designed and operated to prevent unauthorized release into the environment and conducted in accordance with applicable requirements, such as those listed in paragraph B(5) of 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D, Appendix B.

[√] The proposal has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion. This proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.25(a) (1)), is not related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.27(b) (7)), and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211 concerning limitations on actions during preparation of an environmental impact statement.

Results of Review

In accordance with DOE environmental regulations (10 CFR 1021), WAPA has reviewed the proposed action in terms of the level of NEPA review needed. Based on this review, WAPA has determined the proposal is encompassed within a class of action listed in Appendix B to Subpart D (10 CFR 1021.410) which do not require preparation of either an environmental impact statement (EIS) or an environmental assessment (EA).

The proposed action fits within the specified class(es) of action, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is hereby categorically excluded from further NEPA review.


