Description:

A9 Information gathering,

Information gathering (including, but not limited to, literature surveys, inventories, site visits, and audits), data analysis (including, but not limited to, computer modeling), document preparation (including, but not limited to, conceptual design, feasibility studies, and analytical energy supply and demand studies), and information analysis, and dissemination (including, but not limited to, document publication and distribution, and classroom training and dissemination informational programs), but not including site characterization or environmental monitoring. B3.6 Smallscale **laboratory** operations, and pilot projects

Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for smallscale research and development projects; conventional laboratory operations (such as preparation of chemical standards and research and sample analysis); and small-scale pilot projects (generally less than 2 years) frequently conducted to verify a development, concept before demonstration actions, provided that construction or modification would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible). Not included in this category are demonstration actions, meaning actions that are undertaken at a scale to show whether a technology would be viable on a larger scale and suitable for commercial deployment.

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide federal funding to Colorado School of Mines (CSM) for the design, synthesis and laboratory testing of porous organic-inorganic hybrid materials for hydrogen storage. Project work would occur within laboratories at CSM in Golden, CO. Additionally, collaboration is expected to occur with the Hydrogen Materials – Advanced Research Consortium (HyMARC).

Project activities include the design, synthesis, analysis, testing, and optimization of modified zeolitic imidazolate frameworks (ZIFs). All activities would occur in existing laboratories designed for this type of work that would utilize standard laboratory equipment; therefore no modifications, new permits, additional licenses and/or authorizations would be necessary. No ground disturbing activities, no changes in the operation of existing facilities, and no installation of equipment outdoors would occur for project activities. The project would involve the use and handling of various hazardous materials, including metals and organic solvents. All such handling would occur in-lab using proper personal protective equipment (PPE), safety equipment and proper handling and disposal practices to ensure activities would pose no risk to the public. All hazardous and non-hazardous materials would be managed in accordance with Federal, state, and local environmental regulations. All researchers would be fully trained in laboratory safety to mitigate risk and would be provided with PPE, engineering controls, and oversight. Additional policies would be implemented as needed. Organic-inorganic materials could be composed of crystallites at nanoscales often containing cadmium, so these materials would be disposed of as part of CSM's heavy metals waste stream and appropriately handled by the Environmental Health and Safety team. DOE does not anticipate any impacts to resources of concern due to the proposed activities of the project.
