### ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW FOR CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION DETERMINATION Rocky Mountain Region, Western Area Power Administration

Julesburg Hill Microwave Site Access Road Use Authorization Sedgwick County, Colorado Project Number: 2020-042

Expiration Date: December 31, 2021

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), Rocky Mountain Region (RMR), proposes to grant a license agreement to Mountain Tower & Land, LLC (Licensee), for use of the Julesburg Hill (JUH) Microwave Site access road in Sedgwick County, Colorado. The Licensee owns an existing communication tower site located to the northwest of WAPA's JUH Microwave Site, and the properties share a designated access road off of State Highway 385. This revocable, non-exclusive license agreement will allow the Licensee to use the access road on WAPA's property for ordinary passage/driveway purposes to access the Licensee's property. This action is limited to the administrative act of granting the license agreement to cross WAPA property, and will not result in road maintenance, new road construction, or other ground-disturbing activities.

#### B. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

- 1) If the scope of work of this project changes, RMR's Environment Department must be contacted to determine whether additional environmental review is required.
- 2) **This Categorical Exclusion expires on December 31, 2021.** If all project work has not been completed by the expiration date, or if the need for an environmental compliance extension is anticipated, RMR's Environment Department must be contacted for an updated environmental review.
- 3) Any injured, orphaned, or dead birds discovered by the Licensee while crossing WAPA's property must be immediately reported to the RMR Avian Protection Lead at (970) 593-8803 or (970) 826-6672. Additional documentation, such as photographs, may be requested to support RMR's reporting requirements to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
- 4) If any cultural resources are inadvertently discovered by the Licensee while crossing WAPA's property, an RMR Archaeologist must be notified immediately at (970) 461-7563 or (970) 461-7214. A reasonable effort must be made to protect the resources from looting and/or damage.
- 5) If any possible human remains are inadvertently discovered by the Licensee while crossing WAPA's property, an RMR Archaeologist must be notified immediately at (970) 461-7563 or (970) 461-7214 (no later than 24 hours from the time of discovery). A reasonable effort must be made to protect the remains from looting and/or damage.

- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR Part 1506.1 or 10 CFR Part 1021.211.

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**E. <u>Determination</u>**: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
