Arizona: Testbed for Engagement



- 12-18 locations for framing activities
- 4 confirmed: Chandler, Page, Cottonwood, Pinetop Lakeside
- 4-5 large deliberative forums held across the state
- Reaching rural and urban communities through partnerships with local policy makers, civic orgs, libraries, educators, and faith networks
- Emphasis on reaching historically excluded or underserved communities, including tribal communities









Public Values Assessment for CBS

Overall approach guided by Participatory Technology Assessment

- Co-development: Communities, stakeholders, experts, and project team working together
- Developing a variety of engagement methods to inform deliberative forums, including focus groups, storytelling, and citizen science.
- Qualitative and quantitative analysis of public values captured through surveys and participant observations
- Equity and justice considerations to be integrated throughout the project
- Project evaluation focused on 1) participant activities, 2) project process, and 3) project outcomes





Expected Outcomes



- Develop 8-10 engagement activities for collecting hopes, concerns, and public values to reach 180-270 people
- Develop materials for replicable deliberative public forums and convene those forums with 250-300 people
- Generate 4 science fiction stories with original art to be used for engagement activities
- Public value report on CBS in Arizona
- Evaluation of participant learning, interest, and satisfaction with process
- Evaluation of overall project
