Description:

B3.15 Small-scale indoor Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for indoor smallscale research and development projects and small-scale pilot projects using nanoscale materials in accordance with applicable requirements (such as engineering, worker safety, procedural, and administrative regulations) necessary to ensure the containment of any hazardous materials. Construction and modification activities would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible).

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to Rice University to research advancements in the heat exchange of thermal conductivity materials.

The award would be limited to intellectual and laboratory-scale activities. The proposed project activities include the synthesis and testing of carbon-nanotube based materials and devices for thermal management applications. Activities would include spinning fibers, thermal property measurements, material characterization, and prototyping of centimeter scale devices for improved heat exchange. The materials would be manufactured and tested in controlled, research laboratories at Rice University and DexMat, Inc. both of which are in Houston Texas. Thermal exchange devices made of the carbon nanotube materials will be tested in research laboratories at Rice University.

The project would involve the use and handling of various hazardous materials, including chlorosulfonic acids used in the production of carbon nanotube fiber materials at both locations described above. The project would not be expected to have a substantial emission or waste footprint. All material handling would occur in-lab, and according to proper hazardous material handling and disposal practices. These materials and all hazardous materials would be managed following standard operating procedures and in accordance with federal, state, and local environmental regulations. During the manufacturing process, standard laboratory personal protective equipment, including disposable laboratory coats, and disposable masks would be used in the handling of nanoscale materials.

Existing corporate health and safety policies and procedures would be followed, including employee training, proper protective equipment, engineering controls, monitoring, and internal assessments. Additional policies and procedures would be implemented as necessary as new health and safety risks are identified.

All project work would be performed at existing, purpose-built facilities. No modifications to existing facilities, ground disturbing activities, or changes to the use, mission, or operation of existing facilities would be required. No additional permits, licenses, or authorizations would be required. DOE does not anticipate any impacts to resources of concern due to the proposed award activities.
