EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Incident Summary

As of 2:00 PM EDT, Helene is located approximately 125 miles south-southeast of Louisville, Kentucky. Helene is a tropical depression with present movement north-northwest at 35 miles per hour and maximum sustained winds of 35 miles per hour. The eye of Helene made landfall as a Category 4 hurricane near Perry, Florida around 11:10 PM September 26, just east of the mouth of the Aucilla River. Helene is forecasted to slow down in forward speed, and the depression is forecasted to stall over the Tennessee Valley tonight and through the weekend.

Strong gusts of wind continue as far inland as the higher terrain of the southern Appalachians and off the coast of South Carolina but are expected to subside by this evening. Rainfall accumulation totals from 6-12 inches, with isolated totals of 20 inches are expected throughout portions of the southeastern U.S. into the southern Appalachians. Rainfall will likely result in catastrophic and potentially life-threatening flash and urban flooding, along with river flooding and numerous landslides across steep terrain in the southern Appalachians.

Electricity Sector Summary

- As of 3:00 PM EDT, September 27, 4.68 million customers are reported without power. Four states have over 800,000 outages, including Florida with approximately 840,000 outages (8% of customers), Georgia with approximately 994,000 outages (21% of customers), South Carolina utilities with approximately 1,237,000 outages (43% of customers), and North Carolina utilities with approximately 896,000 outages (18% of customers).
- Initial restoration efforts have begun in some affected states. Utilities are experiencing widespread flooding and debris impeding access. Crews are unable to operate in heavily flooded areas and when wind speeds are greater than 30 MPH.
- Utilities in the outheast region made preparations prior to Helene, including pre-staging personnel, materials, and equipment. At least 50,000 personnel from 27 states and the District of Columbia are strategically prepositioned to respond to power outages in the Southeast.

Oil and Natural Gas Sector Summary

- The Ports of Tampa, Manatee, Jacksonville, Canaveral, and Panama City were closed in preparation for Hurricane Helene. Savannah is restricting inbound and outbound traffic.
- U.S. offshore operators currently have shut-in 24% of Gulf of Mexico oil production and 18% of natural gas production from pre-Helene levels.
