

# **Hurricane Helene**

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

### **Incident Summary**

The eye of Helene made landfall at 11:10 PM EDT September 26 as a Category 4 Hurricane with maximum wind speeds of 140 mph near Perry, Florida just east of the mouth of the Aucilla River. Helene weakened as it moved north through the Southeastern United States September 27-28, impacting parts of Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio, and Indiana. The storm brought strong winds and heavy rainfall, which caused flooding in some states.

### **Electricity Sector Summary**

- As of 3:00 PM EDT, October 2, approximately 1.2 million customers are without power, down more than 73% from the region-wide peak of 4.6 million on September 27. Six states still are experiencing significant power outages from the storm, including outages affecting approximately 472,000 customers in South Carolina (17% of total state customers), 350,000 customers in Georgia (7% of total state customers), and 334,000 customers in North Carolina (7% of total state customers).
- Restorations are underway across the affected states; however, utilities in Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina expect to be undergoing repairs through the week.
- Restorations after Helene will be a complex, multi-day effort in many locations due to the extent of damage
  and ongoing access issues. Utilities have been encountering widespread flooding and debris impeding access
  to damaged infrastructure. Communications disruptions are also impacting restoration efforts.
- Utilities in the Southeast region made preparations prior to Helene, including pre-staging personnel, materials, and equipment. At least 50,000 personnel from 36 states, the District of Columbia, and Canada are responding to power outages in the Southeast and Appalachia.

## **Oil and Natural Gas Sector Summary**

- The Port of Tampa and Seaport Manatee are open with restrictions to daylight transit only.
- Power outages throughout the affected region may be impacting operations at retail fuel stations, bulk terminals, pipelines, and other oil and natural gas infrastructure.

To provide vital supplies and transportation services to a disaster area in the United States, emergency declarations may be issued by the President, Governors of States, or the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA). These declarations trigger the temporary suspension of certain Federal safety regulations, including Hours of Service, for motor carriers and drivers engaged in specific aspects of the emergency relief effort. See 49 CFR 390.23 for the actual emergency regulation.
