EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Incident Summary

Hurricane Milton made landfall near Siesta Key, FL around 8:30 PM EDT, October 9, as a Category 3 storm. Milton brought hurricane force winds to most of central Florida, including the Tampa, Orlando, and Canaveral metropolitan areas. Milton weakened as it crossed the state, emerging over the Atlantic Ocean as a Category 1 storm. Hurricane Milton caused widespread disruption to energy infrastructure across the state.

Electricity Sector Summary

- As of 10:00 AM EDT, October 16, there are 69,000 customer power outages in Florida (<1% of all customers), down from a peak of 3.4 million on October 10.
- Utilities in Florida made preparations prior to Milton. More than 50,000 workers from at least 42 states, the District of Columbia, and Canada are dedicated to the Milton response and restoration effort and were strategically prepositioned in and near Florida before Hurricane Milton made landfall.

Oil and Natural Gas Sector Summary

- The ports of Tampa and Manatee, which supply most of the fuel in the Tampa and Orlando areas are open with restrictions. All other Florida ports are fully open.
- All fuel terminals at the Port of Tampa have had grid power restored and truck loading operations have resumed at most terminals.
- There are no identified regional fuel supply issues in the state. Retail station outages are resolving in areas of the state affected by the storm. Stations with power have been receiving fuel deliveries, and retail station operations are returning to normal as they are resupplied.
- State and federal partners have taken action to facilitate fuel supply into and within the state and are working with industry to ensure fuel is available, especially for response operations.

These declarations trigger the temporary suspension of certain Federal safety regulations, including Hours of Service, for motor carriers and drivers engaged in specific aspects of the emergency relief effort.
